

THE ROYAL VISIT

To Hastings Castle, built by William the Conqueror and now purchased by the Corporation, Princess Elizabeth is escorted by the Mayor at the start of her Sussex tour. And by gift of the owner the nearby glens too now belong to the town. In the grounds 12 fishermen, members of the lifeboat crew, are presented to her Royal Highness.

As a memento Princess Elizabeth joins the well-known fishermen's charity organisation, the Winkle Club, and is presented with a gold and pearl emblem.

At the Central Cricket Ground, ten thousand people, including five thousand children welcome Princess Elizabeth when she arrives to receive the title-deeds. The glens and cliffs were presented by Major Carlisle Sayer to mark this Festival year.

After handing the deeds to the Mayor, the Princess speaks.

In the county Town, the Mayor of Lewes, Alderman Parish does the honours at Southover Grange where the Princess planted a tree, and it's a big moment for some of the scouts.

At Worthing, nurseform a guard of honour at Courtlands Recovery Hospital, which Princess Elizabeth declared open. During her four days' tour the Princess is covering a wide area of Sussex, so there's not a lot of time to spare.

And so on to Worthing Town Hall.

Escorted by the Mayor, Alderman Green, the Princess inspects the Guard of Honour and a flag-seller receives a donation for the N.S.P.C.C. from its President.
