

THE QUEEN IN WESTMORELAND.

The Queen and the Duke arrive at Appleby at the start of their Lake District tour, and are welcomed at the station by the Lord Lieutenant, the Mayor and Mayoress, and other local leaders.

A big crowd watches Her Majesty as she inspects the guard of honour, in the Cloisters.

After seeing Appleby's ancient charter, she greets the people of the town from the balcony of "The Mool".

The Queen and the Duke next call at Ambleside on Lake Windermere, where a small patient of Balgarth Hospital presents a bouquet with due solemnity.

At Waterhead Pier, the motor vessel Teal waits to take the royal visitors down the lake to Bowness.

Captain Jackson welcomes them aboard. On the four-mile trip to Bowness, crowds on the lake and on shore wave a greeting to the Teal and the most important passengers she has ever carried.

The population of Bowness crowd to the water's edge, for a better view of the Queen and the Duke as they come ashore.

From Lake Windermere the royal couple drive to Kendal, where another big crowd is waiting to see them.

At the County Hall, there are two receptions - an informal one from the windows, and a more formal one from the Mayor - a typical combination when the Queen visits her people.
