OUTPOSTS OF PEACE - IRISH ARMY MANOEUVRES

Among the small nations of Western Europe, there are very few which have so far sveided being drawn into war. But one at least has so far been able to maintain her national ingegrity. Since last September she has kept a small but efficient army in a state of constant readiness. Nachine guns and their crews move by motor transport until they get within reach of the enemy when they fall back on manpower. Under fire the wheels are disconnected and in a few minutes the guns begin to bark. The mechanisation of the artillery is complete and a sure sign of the advance of modern warfare. Notorised forces on the road are escorted by aircraft. The danger of enemy aircraft on troop movements can be appreciated from these pictures. The young army of Ireland rides into the future, facing its destiny with hope and confidence.

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
