SALVAGE FROM THE SEA.

New Zealand before the War, the stranded PORT BOWEN was having her cargo taken ashorw. As the 3600 ton vessel settled herself into her sandy grave, a jetty was built out from the sandhills and, the cargo retrieved after which she was to be left to break up.
