AIRGRAPH LETTERS.

When Temmy Atkins writes heme from the Middle East, delivery of his letters is being speeded up by a new service introduced by the Post Office. They will take only two weeks.

Having written his letter on a special form, with address in block letters, it goes into a window envelope for posting. The postal authorities photograph the letter on a small film, thus reducing the letter to a fraction of its original size. Over four thousand "reduced" letters weigh only one pound. The mindature film is then sent by aeroplane to its destination, where the letters was on the rell are speedily and individually enlarged, each one thus regaining (in the main) its original form.

Finally the emlargements are dried, and they are ready for a final trimming before being placed in envelopes for delivery. By this service, carrying space is reduced by nearly 200 times. AND THAT'S SOMETHING these days. So littel gel, parity you won't wait so long for your letters from now on.
