SYRIA: OFFICIAL ENTRY INTO BEYROUTH.

The Acre-Nakura read presents an unusual pictures as Allied advance forces make their way towards Beyreuth....the tdrms of the Syrian armistice include the occupation, by the Allies, of the whole of Syria and the Labanon. As Beyreuth is the chief administrative centre of Syria, it follows that its occupation should present an impressive spectacle.....after an advance guard of mechanised units, sum-tanned war-hardened men of the Imperial Forces march into the City behind an Australian band playing martial afts.....thousands of people lining the streets show their approval; for they know that the eccupation is not one of compuset but of liberation....As for the treops, take a look at these splendid chaps from "down under". Every man as happy as a sand-bey at haging played an active part inforeventing the Boche from installing himself in the Middle East....

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Syrians are much impressed by the parade of allied might; the Aussies have no complaint against their reception...the people gather in force in the Place des Martyrs to watch an inspection by General Sir Henry Maitland Wilson, G.O.C., and General Catroux, commanding the <u>Free</u> French. General Catroux has been charged by General de Gaulle with the task of bringing about the establishment of legislative assembles and the fermation of governments enjoying pepular ceffidence. After completion of the formalities of taking over the City, one of the first duties of General Wilson and General Catroux is to attend a reception at which they greet dignitaries of the Church and other high officials....the cordial welcome the Syrians receive augurs well for the greet relationship between the allies-in-eccupation and the liberated peoples.

The reception over, General Lavarack, commanding the Australian treeps, accompanies General Wilson and General Catroux on a further tour of inspection....Everywhere they go they are welcomed with open arms, for the people know that the Allies have completed one of the most difficult tasks an army has ever been called upon to perform...... And now we go North to the Turkish-Syrian frontier where men of our patrols are greeted as brothers by Turkish soldiers. This is the first recorded instance of fraternisation between B ritish and Turkish troops in the war. Turkish delight is good to eat....it^{*}s also good to see!

Going South again we witness another cheerful aspect of the Syrian Campaign; The arrival of a trainload of British and Australian soldiers who were taken prisoners by the Vichy French, and are now Convention released under the terms of the Commention ending hestilities..... Are those boys pleased? They couldn't be happier if they learned that Hitler had broken his neck:
