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THE THREE POWER CONFERENCE IN MOSCOW

The historic mission to Moscow. Lord Beaverbrook goes aboard a British warship on the first stage of his journey to the Kremlin. He is followed by a number of service chiefs and experts from Great Britain and the United States of America...Not a single trip-up occurred to hinder the departure.

On board the warship are gathered the Ministers and advisers, with Mr. Averill Harriman heading the United States delegation. Shorn of all ceremony they speed to the side of M. Stalin and his fellow Commissars, for Russia needs in a hurry all the help she can get in her darkest hour. A Hudson aircraft flies past, evidence of the ~~high~~ thorough protection given by the services to the men upon whom so much depends.

The chronicles of this war may one day tell us more about this journey than we can speak of now...As the delegates are disembarking, let us travel to where the representatives of the Soviet Union await their visitors at a Russian airport. Speeding to them on the last stage of their journey, come the men who represent the help which the U.S.S.R. NEEDS SO URGENTLY.

Journey's end. Among the first to welcome the delegates is Sir Stafford Cripps, and the Deputy Peoples Commissar for Foreign Affairs M. Vyshinsky. Then a salute to the three great powers as the Russian Band plays the National Anthem of each.

This was a visit of urgent business. Little time was given to anything but the courtesies of one foreign power to another. The ceremony of welcome ended with a really fine march past of picked Russian soldiers.

As the Russians are giving of their hearts blood in the titanic struggle battles in defence of their Motherland, we are glad to be able to say that much aid is already there, and more is on the way. The discussions in the Kremlin (thanks to the splendid work of Lord Beaverbrook, Mr. Averill Harriman and M. Stalin) brought about an ~~infinite~~ infinitely satisfactory understanding between the U.K., the U.S.A., and the U.S.S.R.
