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RAIDS ON RANGOON.

Participating largely in the Defence of Rangoon, cleverly decorated Tomahawk fighters are got ready for the interception of Jap Raiders. American volunteer group pilots originally trained to assist the Chinese are now co-operating with the R.A.F. Their job in Burma just now is a full time one.

They're doing some lovely shooting these Tomahawk Pilots. In and around Rangoon may be seen bits and pieces of the yellow birds they've knocked down. The vital Burma Road and Rail links that reach out from Rangoon are the immediate Japanese objectives. The Burmese Capital is suffering heavy aerial bombardment.

At a suburban station a heavily laden refugee train pulls in bringing Indian families returning from the Jungle after recovering from the first shock of Japanese Blitz.

The Governor of Burma, Sir Reginald Dorman-Smith, offers words of sympathy to a man whose wife was killed in the raid. In this city of half a million people an A.R.P. system has grown up and already won its spurs in battle. Burma's number one City faces up to a mass Japanese assault.
