FRENCHMEN REMEMBER

A hundred and fifty three years ago the people of France overthrew despotism. The Fourteenth of July (Bastille Day) is commemorated in London, when, at Wellington Barracks, General de Gaulle decorates a number of Fighting Frenchmen for gallantry in action. Awards to Sailors and Soldiers who are part of the true France which is standing to arms, and fighting for the liberation of their Motherland. While all celebration of France's National Day is forbidden by Laval and his Nazi masters, the Fighting French march proudly in the heart of London.

Past the Statue of Marshal Foch (where earlier General de Gaulle had laid a wreath) detachments of Fighting French units march, preceded by a Military Band. The spirit of "Le Quatorze Juillet" burns fiercely in the hearts of these men.

In the parade are men of the first French Commando unit formed in Great Britain. It is good to see once more the quick Military step, and to cheer the men and women of Fighting France.
