QUENTIN REYNOLDS REPORTS.... JAPANESE BOMB RAIDS.

The flames of war reach the Alaskan doorway to America. At Dutch Harbour, on Unalaska Island, Jap bombers fired the Naval Station, while barracks and storehouses at Port Mears also went up in flames.

In the first twenty-minute raid here forty four of my countrymen lost their lives. Each and every one will be avenged. In another part of the Aleutian Chain, the old station ship NORTHWESTERN, was hit, but more valuable ships escaped.

Away down South, on New Guinea, is Port Moresby, stumbling block to invasion of Australia. Here, American land forces are co-operating with Australians.

An air raid alert, and anti-aircraft batteries go into action, for the seventieth time in four months, against Jap Raiders. They are after newly arrived transports.

Spectacular bombing, but little harm done. They get a transport, but all the troops are safely ashore before the direct hit which set her aflame. Gunners drive off the last of the raiders, as the ship is abandoned.

The day of retribution is coming, when the United Nations will see to it that the Rising Sun will set -- IN THE EAST.
