

AXIS PRISONERS IN ALGIERS.

Moving day for German airmen taken prisoner in the vicinity of Algiers. Among them is a smattering of Italians, also transferring from their prison camp to another place of internment overseas. This film is enlarged from pictures taken by a member of the U.S. Forces using a miniature cine-camera.

Knowing that the German and Italians in each others company are as happy as a tin of worms at a fishing party, we can imagine what a jolly time they must have had during their drive to the Quay.

The wife of a German airman bids farewell to her husband. Their separation will be short lived as she has a ticket for the same ship along with other undesirables rounded up. And now the Axis partners in their lorries head off to the docks.

The absence of onlookers is explained by the fact that the authorities, knowing how near the local inhabitants of Algiers came to manhandling other German and Italian prisoners, placed them under a strong guard to prevent any serious disturbance. When you come to think of it, it must be quite alarming to be so univereally hated. They feel much safer in Allied custody than in the countries they have over-run.
