

OPERATION HEAVILY IN THE ALLIED HANDS
NORTH AFRICAN CAMPAIGN.....FURTHER PICTURES.

One of the ports invested during the great allied expedition to North Africa was Bougie, the one-time "Little Mecca" of the Arabs lying 120 miles East of Algiers. Strong forces of sea-borne troops were carried ashore in landing craft to occupy the town. Bougie's proximity to Tunisia made it a key point in the allied plan. Not an hour's flying distance from here is being fought the Battle of Tunisia. These men were among the first to place Bougie under Allied control.

By falling evening light we see some of the fierce anti-aircraft fire which was put up at points all along the 2000 miles of North African Coast, as Axis planes tried to take the sting out of a blow which had taken them so completely by surprise. Here's a bomber knocked out by a shell-burst. Pictures of the damage they inflicted on units of our shipping are now available. Censorship releases these pictures of burning ships which formed part of the convoy engaged on the greatest amphibian operation in history. Part of the price which was paid along the seaboard reaching from Casablanca to Buna. Though the balance sheet of Naval losses has been disclosed, the ~~big~~ figures of our losses in Merchant shipping remain unpublished. The First Lord of the Admiralty prefers that the enemy continue to rely upon the usual false Nazi claims.

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
