The motorbous Admiral Darlan. These are the first pictures
to be released by the Censor of the scene in Algiers at the conclusion
of the Armistice in North Africa. The use of Darlan's authority
as a temporary expedient has resulted in much controversy. General
Eisenhower had to deal with a shifty customer, a man who astutely
somersaulted out of the pro)Axis camp, and landed, not in a Nasi
Concentration Camp, but among his previously professed enemies watching
a parade.

Men like Darlan don't usually stay put for very long, especially when epinions like "Into the drink with the Admiral, we want De Gaulle" are left lying about.

A much more pleasing sight in Algiers is the French submarine CASABJANCA which escaped from Toulon. Strange how the name "White House" has cropped up for the Americans in North Africa. CASABJANCA... The MARSOUIN made a dash for it and is now a free and Fighting Frenchman.
