

**THE SHERIFFS FROM NORTH AFRICA.**

The passing of Admiral Darlan sees long lines of people filing into the Summer Palace, Algiers, to see the lying in state of the assassinated High Commissioner.

The Admiral's body rests in the Grand Entrance Hall. The steady stream of onlookers taking several hours to pass the coffin.

Madame Darlan leaves the Cathedral where the Funeral Service was held. Attending also were Admiral Cunningham, Generals Giraud and Eisenhower, and numerous other personalities in the North African scene. ✓

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Colonel Elliott Roosevelt the President's second son is decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross at Maison Blanche aerodrome by Major General James Doelittle. The award is made (says the citation) for "heroism and extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flights". Colonel Roosevelt is Commanding Officer to a photographic group assigned to the American forces in North Africa. The decoration also recognises the skill and courage of a fine officer. ✓

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A first class military objective picked out by the Luftwaffe in Tunisia. An ambulance train bombed and machine-gunned by German pilots. The most conspicuous part of the train was the Red Cross on the roof - the Jerry pilots got a dead sight on it. Many were killed and wounded in this particular odious sample of Nazi strafing. ✓

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An American battery opens up on the Tebourba front. United States Artillery in action, shelling an objective which we're able to see from the artillery officer's observation post overlooking the battery and the target. Take a look at the place, and we'll get back in time for another salvo.

The shelling draws the attention of German aircraft sent over to bomb the batteries' position. If you knew a better 'ole, now's the time.
