Pilots of Amy Co-operation Command who fly the long-range American Hastange are specialists in train busting. In order to assess the destructive power of these aircraft we visit an R.A.F. practice range. The Station Commander's confidence in the pilots is so great that he stations the comercian within 100 yards of the leavies. Hustangs have a top speed of approximately 400 miles an hour.
