She has accommodation for 72 passengers, although on one trial flight, she actually carried as many as 170 people at once 1

--in just over three hours, and carries 38 people, a crew of 15 and 23 passengers, including --

-- Lady Drummond Hay, here seen looking out through one of the port-holes.

--before making her next "hop". Many prominent people pay her a visit, anxious to see the inside. She is --

-- just like an hotel; or at least, she has all --
