THE BUFFS AT CANTERBURY.

In this annual service two-thousand past and present members march into the Grand Cathedral officially to remember. These services, impressive though they may be, are but spasmodic outward shows of the constant inner thought of that dreadful death roll.

Following the 5th Battalion Colours, naked bayonets, glistening in the historic fain of religious peace.

In the Cathedral these Colours will be laid up; their oushodians being the Dean and Chapter.

The Service was broadcast over the Empire. It was listened to by the first Battalion of the Buffs, stationed at Burma. Large crowds witnessed the ceremony. Major General

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Sir Arthur Lynden Bell took the salute as the two-thousand Service and Ex Service men made an imposing march past the great arched door of the Cathedral.

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Jumping from Kent to Perth, Scotland, we are in time to see the Duke

and Duchess of York arrive. It is Perth's

first Royal Visit day since 1914. His Royal Highness

inspects the Black Watch guard-of-honour, prior to performing the opening ceremony of Perth's new art Gallery.
