KING OF SWEDEN'S STATE VISIT.

A Swedish cruiser in the River Thames at Greenwich Pier; and, en beard, the Duke of Edinburgh is first to welcome to Britain, reyal neighbours from across the North Sea; King Gustav VI and Queen Louise, of Sweden

Her Majesty the Queen and other members of the royal frity family, arrived to await their guests on Westminster Piers, and though once again, our summer could do no better than produce another cool and cloudy afternoon --- there was warmth in this meeting between two of the ancient menarchies of Europe

The King's father is well-remembered as a man of amazing vigour, who could still play a game of tennis when he was minety; so the youthfulness of King Gustav VI is not surprising, though he is over seventy. And Lenden was happy, at the start of this four-day State Visit, to give its welcoming cheers to traditional friends.

Following Queen Elizabeth and Gumma King Gustav, the Duke of Edinburgh rode with Queen Louise --- his aunt, who was married in St James's Palace in London

As they dreve along the Malli towards Buckingham Palace, the Britishbern wife of Sweden's king, must have been deeply neved by this great eccasion. Both have made frequent private visits to Britain through the years; but this State Visit, underneath all the pagean try, showed how similar are the ties that link the Severeign and the people in our two countries; where a democratic memarchy is based upon simplicity --- and mutual trust, and goodwill.
