The greatest occasion during the visit of the Queen Mether to New York --- attended by a host of ether notables including Belgian Minister Protector M. More than two thousand five hundred guests were present at this brilliant function. On the fellowing day, the Queen Mother attended the Cathedral of St John the Divine, and later received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. A similar honour was awarded to Dr Adenauer
