evening in London, in the spring of the year. Sir Winston Churchill, in the sash of the Order of the Garter, swelts at No. 10 the arrival of Her Majesty the Queen. Her Majesty, with the Duke of Edinburgh, was dining with her Prime Minister. Behind the recording cameras, crowds packed in famous Downing Street to watch and cheer. For this, they guessed, was the end of an era-

At the dinner, Her Majesty had herself proposed the teast of
Her Prime Minister --- an opportunity, she said, that had fallen to
few of her predecessors. And here the young Queen bade farewell
to the grand old statesman who had served her and our country so
well and so faithfully in war and peace.

The company at this historic dinner had included Ministers of the Grown, leaders of the Opposition --- and Sir Anthony Eden

The next morning, Sir Anthony went to No. 10 once more for the final meeting of the full Cabinet under Sir Winston Churchil Although no announcement had yet been made, it was expected that this day the Prime Minister would offer his resignation to the Queen, and that Sir Anthony would be called upon to fill his place.

In the afternoon, Her Majesty returned to Buckingham
Palace after fulfilling a royal engagement in Sheppey

and Sir Winston left his official home for the weekly sudience of Prime Minister with the Sovereign. Still no announcement had been made; but the crowds that packed the route to wave and cheer, knew that this was a day in history. He had been Prime Minister for a total of nearly nine years.

Then came the announcements SOUND -

Sir Winston Churchill had retired after fifty years in the Rimmins.
