Sir Winston Churchill, in the sash of the Order of the Garter, awaits at No. 10 the arrival of Her Majesty the Queen. Her Majesty, with the Duke of Edinburgh, was dining with her Prime Minister. Behind the recording cameras, crowds packed in famous Downing Street to watch and cheer. For this, they guessed, was the end of an era.

And Sir Winston left his official home for the weekly audience of Prime Minister with the Sovereign. Still no announcement had been made. But the crowds that packed the route to wave and cheer, knew that this was a day in history. He had been Prime Minister for a total of nearly nine years.
