One thing proved by the railway strike was that with the aid roadof good humour and good sense, traffic in London was able to keep on the move. The Home Secretary, Major Lloyd George, was an on-the-spot observer. The Post Office Staff worked nobly to keep the mails on the move --- with the help of Royal Air Force planes for carrying them where the work would normally have been done by trains. Army lorries, too, joined in the job of long-distance Exercise transport

Every available alternative --- including the longneglected river --- was brought into service to get people to
work and home again. And --- shining out like a beacon in what
could so easily have been an atmosphere of gloom, was the
happy-go-lucky good temper with which travellers all over
Britain met the situation. The old wartime spirit of
cameraderie was back once more

Same Some people had to the good idea of showing the name of the place they wanted to get to on a free lift - including that place in Wales.
