

When the Britannia arrived in Copenhagen, King Frederik of Denmark went on board to greet a royal visitor. The Duke of Edinburgh was to be his guest on a ~~visit~~ visit which was to include occasions both informal and formal. *

Another Russian occasion was this show put on by the Incorporated Society of London Fashion designers, for the benefit of the Soviet delegation in London - - with the Deputy Chairman of the Council of Ministers.

After the show, the delegates drank a toast.

And now --- to the White City, for one of the most thrilling long-distance races ever seen in this country. There was a bit of fog hanging about on the track --- but there was a bright sparkle, none the less, in the efforts of Gordon Pirie and Ken Norris against the old master --- Emil Zatopek of Czechoslovakia. This was a match between London and Prague, sponsored by the Evening News. After being held in second place for most of ten thousand metres --- Pirie produced this fantastic burst of speed to win.
