Bright sunshine and the salute of naval guns were the welcome to Britain when Mr Bulganin and Mr Kruschev sailed into Portsmouth on board the XSeviet Navy cruiser Ordjonikidze.

For Mr Bulganin, the Russian Premier, who came first down the gagnway, this was the first visit to Britain for twenty years. For Mr Kruschev, it was the first visit. They were officially welcomed by the First Lord of the Admiralty, Minister of State Lord Reading

Strict security kept back the London crowds as the train came into Victoria Station; but it was with a friendly wave and a smile that Mr Bulganin came on to the platform to meet Sir Anthony Eden. Also in the party waiting to receive the visitors was Foreign Secretary ME Seleyn Lloyd.

There were bouquets from the wivesof the miliana diplomatic corps in London and introductions to other members of the party, there exists a speech of welcome, which was translated by interpretere and then more handshakes before going outside to the waiting fleet of cars.
